

Azerbaijan's Inclusion and the Dawn of a Stronger C6 Order

Azerbaijan's growing engagement with Central Asia marks one of the most significant geopolitical developments in the region in recent years. As conversations intensify about transforming the C5 format into a C6 framework that formally includes Azerbaijan, the move carries far reaching implications for regional cooperation, security, and economic connectivity. This shift reflects a natural evolution, grounded in geography, shared cultural roots, economic complementarities, and a common strategic outlook shaped by the changing global landscape. The inclusion of Azerbaijan would not simply add another member, it would redefine the regional fabric and create a more cohesive and influential Central Asian bloc.

Azerbaijan already maintains multifaceted partnerships with Kazakhstan, Uzbekistan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Turkmenistan, built on cultural identity and historical bonds that stretch across the Caspian Sea. The country has emerged as a bridge between Central Asia, the Caucasus, and further into Europe. Its role in energy corridors, digital infrastructure, and trans continental transport makes it an indispensable partner for any regional cooperation agenda. The evolution from C5 to C6 therefore feels like a natural extension of existing realities, giving formal structure to a cooperation model that is already robust.

The strategic significance of Azerbaijan lies in its ability to advance the East West connectivity that Central Asian states urgently require. The Middle Corridor, one of the most important transport routes of the coming decades, relies heavily on Azerbaijan's infrastructure, ports, and logistics capabilities. By becoming part of a joint regional platform, Azerbaijan can help the Central Asian countries expand their reach into global markets through shorter, secure, and more efficient routes. This in turn supports the vision of building a self reliant, regionally integrated, and economically vibrant Central Asia.

A C6 format would also strengthen the political voice of the region at a time when global power centers are shifting and new alliances are emerging. Central Asia stands at the crossroads of major geopolitical contests. Unity matters now more than ever. Azerbaijan's inclusion enhances collective bargaining power in engagements with major powers, international financial institutions, and global markets. A broader and more united platform can articulate shared concerns more effectively, promote regional stability, and attract larger volumes of foreign investment.

Beyond the economic and geopolitical advantages, cooperation with Azerbaijan strengthens cultural and social linkages within the region. Shared Turkic heritage, linguistic similarities, and centuries of interaction create natural affinities that make collaboration deeper and smoother. These connections help foster trust, an element that remains central to successful regional integration.

As Central Asia navigates a rapidly changing world where energy transitions, technological advancements, and shifting trade patterns shape new opportunities, expanding the grouping to C6 would position the region for sustained progress. It offers a framework that is more inclusive, more strategic, and better suited for the challenges and aspirations of the coming decades.

Azerbaijan's inclusion in the Central Asian platform represents more than a structural adjustment. It is a timely recognition of shared destinies and a step toward building a more connected, more stable, and more prosperous region.

Thai Envoy Envisions Doubling Trade and Building Strong Economic Partnership with Pakistan

Q: At present, what is the scale of trade between Pakistan and Thailand, and where do you see the most potential for growth?

H.E: Our current bilateral trade is valued at approximately \$1.1 billion USD, with a clear imbalance. While this number reflects a strong foundation, it does not fully capture our potential. My primary goal is to strategically double this figure to \$2.2 billion USD within the next 2-3 years. The greatest potential for growth lies in unlocking new areas of collaboration and breaking down existing barriers.

Specifically, we see immense potential in Halal trade, where Thailand's world-class Halal food industry can easily meet the growing demand in Pakistan. We also see opportunities for Pakistan's

high-quality seafood and textile products to gain greater access to the Thai market. The key is to move beyond our traditional goods and embrace a more

Q: How can the two countries work together to diversify trade beyond traditional goods and services?

Diversifying our trade is a cornerstone of our forward-looking vision. We are moving beyond the conventional focus on automobiles and seafood to embracing new, high-growth sectors. We believe in creating a new narrative for our



economic partnership, one that is not limited by geography but is driven by shared economic goals.

Our strategy involves a strong push into the services sector, particularly Information Technology (IT), and fostering collaboration in the Halal food industry, Halal Tourism, also defense industry. Furthermore, we are committed to empowering women in the economic sphere by using e-platforms to sell their products, which will unlock new, innovative revenue streams and contribute to inclusive economic growth. We are also working with UN WOMEN Pakistan through Women in Agriculture and Home Beauty Salon project to enhance their economic independence at the household level. These is a prime example of how we are thinking outside the box to create a more dynamic and equitable trade relationship.

Q: Are there any new agreements or joint ventures under discussion that could significantly boost bilateral trade in the near future?

H.E: Yes, absolutely. The most significant and transformative agreement on

Economic Commission into a more comprehensive Joint Commission, led by our respective Foreign Ministers. This will provide a broader platform to discuss not just trade but also all facets of our bilateral relationship, ensuring a more integrated and coordinated approach to our shared future.

Q: How can Pakistan and Thailand collaborate to enhance connectivity, particularly in logistics, shipping, and air routes, to support greater trade and investment?

H.E: Enhanced connectivity is the lifeblood of our economic partnership. While we have existing air and sea links, our vision is to strengthen these ties to facilitate the rapid movement of goods, people, and ideas. We must work to streamline customs procedures and explore new direct air routes to boost tourism and business travel; increasing the frequency and capacity of the air services between the two country are also one of our top priority.

By improving logistics and creating more efficient shipping channels, we can reduce the cost and time of trade,



the horizon is the Free Trade Agreement (FTA). This is not merely a technical document; it is a strategic framework that will fundamentally change the way we do business. Our current focus is on building a shared understanding of the mutual benefits of the FTA for Pakistan. For Pakistan, it will mean lower costs for raw material imports from Thailand, making local production more efficient and competitive. It will also offer Pakistani consumers access to a wider range of high-quality goods at more competitive prices.

Beyond the FTA, we are also working to elevate our dialogue. We are in discussions to transform the existing Joint making our economies more competitive and attractive for investors. This is a shared objective, and we are committed to exploring all avenues for collaboration, from logistics and port management to the pilot project on paperless custom procedure with ASEAN (if possible).

Q. Which sectors in Pakistan do you see as the most promising for Thai investors, and likewise, what opportunities in Thailand would appeal most to Pakistani businesses?

H.E: For Thai investors, Pakistan offers a wealth of opportunities, particularly in its high-growth sectors. We are looking at a country with a large, young popula-



tion and vast potential. I see immense promise in Pakistan's agriculture, IT, renewable energy, and mining sectors. The Pakistani government's Special Investment Facilitation Council has made significant strides in creating a more investor-friendly environment, and we encourage Thai businesses to explore these exciting prospects.

Conversely, for Pakistani businesses, Thailand presents itself as a hub of manufacturing and innovation. Opportunities abound in our advanced manufacturing and data center sectors. Thailand's strong infrastructure and strategic location at the heart of ASEAN make it an ideal base for Pakistani companies looking to expand their footprint and access the broader Southeast Asian market.



Q. How do you assess the role of free trade agreements, regional groupings like ASEAN, and Pakistan's linkages in South Asia in shaping future economic relations?

H.E: These agreements and regional groupings are not just a part of the landscape; they are the very scaffolding upon which our future economic relations will be built. The FTA is the linchpin of our bilateral economic vision, and its successful conclusion will be a game-changer. It will formalise a partnership that benefits both our economies and fosters a more predictable and transparent trading environment.

Furthermore, Thailand's role as a key member of ASEAN and Pakistan's stra-



tegic location in South Asia create a powerful synergy. We are actively promoting a policy of "Look West," which complements Pakistan's "Vision East Asia" policy. By strengthening our bilateral ties, we are not just connecting two countries; we are building a bridge between two dynamic regions, unlocking unprecedented opportunities for trade and investment.

Q: In your view, how much work still needs to be done to fully realize the economic potential between our two countries, and what steps are

being taken in that direction?

H.E: To be frank, there is a significant amount of works still ahead of us. But this is not a challenge—it is a tremendous opportunity. Our vision is comprehensive and focuses on four key pillars: trade and investment, business cooperation, people-to-people connections, and enhanced diplomatic and security collaboration.

We are tackling these areas with a renewed sense of urgency and purpose.

The immediate steps being taken in-



clude accelerating the FTA negotiations, fostering greater collaboration between our business councils, and initiating high-level meetings to ensure a coordinated and strategic approach. By focusing on concrete, measurable outcomes, we are building a foundation that will ensure our economic potential is not just a vision but a reality.

Q: How important is cultural diplomacy, tourism, and educational exchange in strengthening the relationship between Pakistan and Thailand?

H.E: Cultural diplomacy is the soul of our relationship. While trade figures are important, the bonds of friendship, mutual respect, and shared history are what truly sustain our partnership. Pakistan and Thailand are connected by a shared cultural heritage, particularly the ancient Gandhara civilization. This historical link provides a unique and powerful foundation for our modern relationship while also presenting a wonderful opportunity to welcome more Thai tourists who wish to see such majestic civilization with their own eyes.

We are actively using cultural diplomacy to bring our peoples closer. A prime example is the recent presentation of a replica of the Fasting Buddha to Thailand, which has opened up a new chapter of friendship and understanding. We are also preparing a major Gandhara Exhibition in Bangkok for the 75th anniversary of our diplomatic ties next year. These initiatives are designed to foster tourism, promote educational exchanges, and strengthen the people-to-peo-

Meanwhile, Thailand is pushing forward with our health diplomacy through the sharing of know-how and best practices on Universal Health Coverage and Primary Healthcare with Pakistan based on the Thai Model which is globally renowned.

Q: Next year marks 75 years of diplomatic relations between Pakistan and Thailand, How would you describe the journey of bilateral ties over the decades?

H.E: The journey has been one of consistent and evolving friendship, marked by mutual respect and shared principles. Our relationship began with the establishment of diplomatic ties in 1951 and has since grown into a robust, multifaceted partnership. Over the decades, we have seen cooperation flourish across political, economic, and cultural spheres. It is a journey that has seen us navigate global challenges together, and it has strengthened our resolve to work even more closely in the future.

Q: What are the most significant achievements in Pakistan Thailand relations that you believe have set the foundation for stronger future cooperation?

H.E: The most significant achievements

are those that have built the bridges of understanding between our two peoples. I would highlight the deepening of cultural and educational ties, particularly through our shared Gandhara heritage. The presentation of the Fasting Buddha replica and the upcoming Gandhara exhibition are not just symbolic gestures; they are powerful tools for strengthening our bonds and paving the way for a new era of people-to-people connection.

On the economic front, the sustained effort to advance the FTA negotiations and the re-establishment of the Joint Commission and reviving of the Joint Economic Commission are foundation-

Uzbekistan and Pakistan Celebrate Literary Diplomacy at Landmark Book Launch in Islamabad









Diplomats, ministers, scholars, journalists, and members of Islamabad's civil society gathered at the Marriott Hotel in Islamabad for the launch of "Uzbekistan, The Third Renaissance, Concept of the Future," a book by noted Pakistani journalist Muhammad Abbas Khan. Organized by the Embassy of the Republic of Uzbekistan in Pakistan in collaboration with the Daily Ittehad Media Group and the Center for Regional Connectivity with a Shared Future (CRCSF), the event celebrated intellect, cultural affinity, and the enduring friendship between the two nations.

The 446-page work traces Uzbekistan's modernization under President Shavkat Mirziyoyev and outlines the vision of the "Third Renaissance," centered on human dignity, creativity, and openness.

In his keynote address, Ambassador Alisher Tukhtayev described the occasion as "a celebration of shared dreams, common heritage, and brotherhood." He praised the author for portraying Uzbekistan's reform journey and highlighted that under President Mirziyoyev's leadership the country has achieved steady economic growth exceeding six percent annually, its GDP doubling to 115 billion dollars and ex-


pected to surpass 130 billion this year.

Foreign investment has risen beyond 130 billion dollars, while nearly 9,000 new enterprises have attracted 35 billion dollars in the past year alone. Ambassador Tukhtayev noted that tourism generated 3 billion dollars in 2024 and is expanding rapidly as Uzbekistan targets renewable energy of 54 percent by 2030.

Ambassador Tukhtayev reaffirmed that relations between Uzbekistan and Pakistan have reached the level of a genuine

strategic partnership. The High-Level Strategic Cooperation Council cochaired by President Mirziyoyev and Prime Minister Shehbaz Sharif provides a strong framework for cooperation.

He pointed to new direct flights between Tashkent and Islamabad as well as Tashkent and Lahore, a simplified visa regime, and progress on the Trans-Afghan Railway Project as symbols of expanding connectivity. "Bilateral trade has already reached 405 million dollars in the first nine months of 2025,












marking a 130 percent increase from last year, and our goal is two billion dollars," he stated.

Federal Minister for Information and Broadcasting Attaullah Tarar, the Chief Guest, hailed the book as "a complete recipe for national greatness." He said it offers deep insights into Uzbekistan's social, political, and economic transformation and called President Mirziyoyev "a leader of action who turns vision into reality." Minister Tarar also appreciated

Daily Ittehad Media Group and its Editor-in-Chief Tahir Farooq for strengthening cultural diplomacy and promoting Pakistan-Uzbekistan relations.

Guest of Honour Murtaza Solangi, Spokesperson to the President of Pakistan, emphasized the centuries-old cultural linkages between the two nations. Algeria and Pakistan Celebrate Deepening Ties on the 71st National Day of the People's Democratic Republic of Algeria



The Embassy of Algeria in Islamabad hosted a grand reception to mark the 71st anniversary of Algeria's National Day, commemorating the Glorious Revolution of November 1, 1954. The event brought together dignitaries, diplomats, and business representatives in a warm atmosphere of friendship and partnership.

The Chief Guest, Haroon Akhtar Khan, Special Assistant to the Prime Minister on Industries and Production, attended the ceremony along with ambassadors, senior officials, parliamentarians, and members of the business community. A ceremonial cake-cutting added a festive touch to the evening, symbolizing unity and celebration.

In his address, Algerian Ambassador Dr Brahim Romani paid tribute to the strong ties between Algeria and Pakistan, recalling that Pakistan was among the first nations to support Algeria's struggle for independence during the 1955 Bandung Conference and later at the United Nations. "We recall with pride and gratitude Pakistan's unwavering support during our revolution and after independence in 1962," he said.

Ambassador Romani highlighted Algeria's strategic importance as the largest country in Africa and the Arab world, serving as a bridge between Africa, Europe, and Asia. He underscored that under the leadership of President Abdelmadjid Tebboune, Algeria is witnessing remarkable economic growth and modernization, with a GDP of around 270 billion dollars in 2024 and projections to reach 400 billion dollars by 2027.

He described Algeria as an emerging industrial and energy hub, producing 50 billion cubic meters of gas annually and hosting over 17 000 new investment projects under a reformed investment law designed to benefit both local and foreign investors. He also emphasized Algeria's leadership in Africa's start-up ecosystem, with over 10 000 active companies.

Ambassador Romani further referred to the success of the In-

tra-African Trade Fair 2024 hosted by Algeria in September, which saw participation from 132 countries and trade contracts worth 48.3 billion dollars. He said this demonstrated Algeria's growing role as a regional business hub and its commitment to promoting integration and cooperation across the African continent.

Inviting Pakistani investors to explore Algeria's vast opportunities in energy, mining, agriculture, and manufacturing, the envoy said both nations could build new economic bridges under Pakistan's "Engage Africa" policy. "Algeria stands ready to strengthen partnerships with Pakistan and to open new avenues of cooperation across the public and private sectors," he added.

Special Assistant Haroon Akhtar Khan praised Algeria's impressive progress and reaffirmed Pakistan's desire to strengthen its ties with the North African nation. He said that Pakistan is an open, reliable, and rewarding destination for global investors, and the government is committed to building a strong industrial framework that promotes sustainable growth. China's Visionary and Ambitious Fifteenth Five Year Plan





In every tickle of clock, if dollar dances the rupee stumbles, the game of trade war tiding tight, the pulse of stock exchange beat relentlessly and innovation race faster than ever we thought. The world is full of unpredictability, but the Asian dragon has launches its new plan to make its country stand firm on its foot, on the global stage. And that is how the Chinese government are eradicating the evils and loopholes from their system towards a nation of progress.

The communique prioritized technological self-reliance for the great economic tug of war. An innovation-led growth strategy has been built to improve industrial machinery, integrated circuits, high-end instruments, zero-to-one breakthroughs, aero-space, new energy, modern-agro machines, low altitude economy, trillion yuan market, which will take shape for the rest of the decade. On top of that, China is building a policy of what we can call "controlled globalization", encouraging innovation and market efficiency, but always under the vigilant supervision of the state. It is an action plan to protect its inimitable resources, to ensure its national security and long-term power. With the aim that Western sanctions and export bans can't easily hurt it. The



recent meeting between Donald Trump and President Xi Jinping is a testimony to "managed decoupling" by both sides. The US has cut short the tariffs by 10-20 percent, while China has postponed its rare-earth export, which shows a wise tactic of not changing its total direction. By easing trade tensions, China is trying to calm global markets while still keeping its strongest bargaining tools, rare-earth minerals and advanced technologies, under firm control.

One of China's proactive approaches to competing at a high level of innovation on the global stage is to increase the scale of quality over quantity. China has shifted its focus from measuring success solely by its output and exports to reducing its reliance on foreign countries. To achieve this, China will advance its core hardware, including AI, quantum, biotech, chips, precision machinery, battery, and renewable manufacturing. The Chinese government is building research and development labs and providing subsidies and preferential credit to strengthen its domestic industry and build high-value industrial and technological capacity, making it hard to disrupt. If China succeeds in achieving "high-quality innovation," it can change the world into two scenarios. First, the countries will be less dependent on one or two Western suppliers; rather, new windows of access will open up. Secondly, the world can drift into two rival spheres, one led by China and the other by the West. This fragmentation would raise costs and complicate operations for firms and policymakers alike. But, it would be quite challenging to shift the economy from mass production to innovation-led growth. This transition requires significant capital investment and a cultural shift that fosters creativity. The plan emphasizes "dual circulation," promoting domestic demand and internal innovation as twin pillars of growth. A key challenge is restoring confidence in the private sector, which has been affected by regulatory tightening. The plan's focus on "common prosperity" aims to narrow the wealth gap, requiring substantial fiscal resources to expand social services and maintain high employment. Local governments, already burdened by debt, face the challenge of funding these initiatives. The success of the plan will depend on China's ability to balance economic growth with social equity and manage its finances wisely.

This Plan reframes sustainability not as a moral obligation but as a competitive advantage, a tool to secure leadership in the global race for clean technologies. As Dr. Li Wei, an energy economist at the Oxford Institute for Energy Studies, observes, Beijing has learned from history that "the nations who controlled the key technologies of the era... became the global superpowers" and is now applying this logic to clean tech. By pledging to reach peak carbon and neutrality "actively and prudently," Beijing signals pragmatic ambition. It cannot dismantle coal overnight but will use its industrial scale to dominate solar, battery, and electric



vehicle markets. This approach fuses environmental goals with national power projection. However, the credibility of this green rise depends on implementation. The same export-driven model that guarantees its manufacturing lead is now triggering protectionist responses in Europe and the US, creating a critical test. Ultimately, the world is watching to see if China can decarbonize its grid fast enough. If successful, this strategy would cement China not merely as a clean tech supplier but as the world's first true "green superpower," wielding control over the tools of the energy transition as a primary lever of geopolitical influence.

The 15th five-year plan of the Communist Party of China is an enlightened vision that will change not only the nation's destiny but also world politics. The plan aims to harness the intellect of the nation's leaders to transform China into a great and beautiful nation. Beijing signals that power in the 21st century will belong to those who control the technologies of the future. The plan's emphasis on "smart, green, and integrated development" reframes climate policy as an industrial strategy, allowing China to turn sustainability into a source of strength.

By improving the governance, political stability, promoting modernity and liberalism, and addressing loopholes in the system, China is telling the world that without transparency, rule of law, and meritocracy, success is like chasing shadows, always out of reach. The coming years will reveal whether Beijing can truly reconcile its twin aspirations to lead the world in innovation while preserving unchallenged political control. General Al-Asadi expressed admiration for PAF's professionalism and technological evolution, particularly its National Aerospace Science and Technology Park, and expressed interest in replicating this model in Iraq. The visit included tours of the PAF Cyber Command and ISR Center, where the delegation was briefed on modern warfare systems. The visit reaffirmed the enduring defense cooperation between the two nations and opened new avenues for partnership in aerospace innovation.

Pakistan-Bahrain Defense Cooperation

In another significant engagement, General Shaikh Mohammed Bin Isa Bin Salman Al Khalifa, Commander of the Bahrain National Guard, met Air Chief Marshal Sidhu at Air Headquarters. The discussions focused on expanding training programs, joint



exercises, and defense industry collaboration.

The Bahraini Commander lauded PAF's exemplary performance in its recent conflict with India, praising its operational readiness, professional excellence, and courage. He expressed Bahrain's keen interest in enhancing bilateral cooperation through institutional training and mutual exchange programs.

Air Chief Marshal Sidhu highlighted Pakistan and Bahrain's long-standing religious and historical ties and reaffirmed PAF's resolve to strengthen collaboration, particularly in aviation training and strategic planning. The meeting concluded with mutual agreement to broaden defense engagement and pursue future visits by senior Bahrain Air Force officials.

Climate Resilience and Health, Pakistan Red Crescent Strengthens Partnerships in Norway

A focused drive for climate adapted health systems and disaster response places vulnerable communities at the center

During a visit to Oslo, the Chairperson of the Pakistan Red Crescent Society met the President of the Norwegian Red Cross to advance cooperation on climate impacts, health, water, sanitation, and disaster response. She called for greater international aid for long term rehabilitation of flood affected communities in Pakistan and emphasized climate justice and international humanitarian law.

Meetings with the Acting Secretary General of the Norwegian Red Cross and the Director for the Humanitarian Department at the Norwegian Agency for Development Cooperation covered climate adapted health, emergency response, and support for returning populations. Both sides reaffirmed a shared mission to alleviate suffering and build resilience.





Pakistan and ASEAN Envoys Target a Higher Trade Trajectory

The Federal Minister for Commerce hosted ambassadors and senior diplomats from seven ASEAN member states to deepen trade, investment, and people to people ties. He outlined policy steps on tariffs, vehicles, and facilitation and highlighted Pakistan's role as a gateway to Central Asia through expanding transit arrangements.

Technology transfer, value addition, and skills development headline a new push to unlock true potential with Southeast Asia

Participants discussed moving beyond commodity trade toward collaboration in technology, skills, and infrastructure. The meeting concluded with agreement to map concrete actions that lift trade from current levels to a more ambitious, long term path.

Palestinian Question, Policy Imperatives for Pakistan and the Region

A sober call for action urges sanctions and real consequences, as speakers link Gaza's tragedy to global moral responsibility



The Institute of Regional Studies convened a special roundtable on the Palestinian question and regional stability, exploring humanitarian, historical, and political dimensions and their implications for Pakistan's foreign policy. Chairing the session, the President of the Institute described the unprecedented loss of life in Gaza and reaffirmed Pakistan's position in support of a just peace based on self determination.

Ambassador Zohair Mohammad Hamdallah Zaid delivered the keynote, stressing that the conflict stems from dispossession rather than religion and that Palestine has historically been home to Muslims, Christians, and Jews. He highlighted mass displacement and settlement expansion and urged decisive international action, including sanctions, to halt aggression and open a path to peace. Ambassador Ashraf Jehangir Qazi framed the issue as a global moral test, arguing that policies have rendered the two state approach unworkable and that a just solution requires a framework where people of all faiths live together in dignity. Participants concluded by noting the gap between rhetoric and reality, the enabling role of continued settlement funding, and the need for consistent media attention to daily civilian suffering.

Hungary's National Day Shines in Islamabad









The Embassy of Hungary marked its National Day in Islamabad with an elegant reception that also celebrated sixty years of diplomatic relations between Hungary and Pakistan. The event brought together diplomats, officials, business leaders, and members of civil society in a setting that reflected friendship, heritage, and shared aspirations.

Hungarian Ambassador Zoltán Varga opened the evening with warm remarks, expressing gratitude for the strong relationship between Budapest and Islamabad. He described Pakistan as a reliable partner and highlighted future opportunities in trade, education, energy, and cultural exchange. Minister of State for Finance and Railways Bilal Azhar Kayani joined the ambassador for a cake cutting ceremony, extending congratulations to the government and people of Hungary and reaffirming Pakistan's commitment to strengthening bilateral engagement.


New Envoys Present Credentials to President Zardari











China's Expanding Role in Driving the Global Green Transition

As the world moves deeper into what many describe as the decisive decade for climate action, the global green transition has increasingly come to define twenty first century geopolitics, economic strategy, and development discourse. Amid these rapidly evolving dynamics,

China's role stands out not only for its scale and ambition, but also for its practical delivery, policy innovation, and support to developing nations. The country's expanding leadership, often understated in Western narratives, has become a central pillar in global efforts to confront climate change and accelerate sustainable transformation worldwide.

China's contribution is multidimen-

sional and rooted in a vision that links ecological civilization, economic modernization, and shared development. This vision is now shaping some of the most consequential climate initiatives, from renewable energy deployment to green financing, technology diffusion, and South-South cooperation.

A major dimension of China's role lies in its domestic transformation. Over the past decade, the country has undertaken one of the fastest and largest clean energy expansions in human history. Today, China hosts the world's largest installed capacity of solar and wind power, and it leads the global supply chain for clean technology, including photovoltaics, batteries, and electric vehicles. The establishment of the world's largest carbon trading market, covering thousands of enterprises across multiple sectors, signals a commitment to market based mechanisms that can gradually shift industrial behavior and strengthen emissions management.

This domestic momentum has global implications. China's scale allows it to bring down costs of green technologies worldwide. Countries across Africa, Asia, Latin America, and even parts of Europe have been able to accelerate their own clean energy transitions because Chinese innovation made renewable solutions affordable. Solar power in many developing countries is now cheaper than fossil based alternatives precisely because China invested early and at scale in manufacturing capacity. This is not simply an economic contribution; it is an enabler of global climate progress.

Equally significant is China's approach to international climate cooperation, which has increasingly emphasized partnership, capacity building, and respect for national development priorities. Through the Belt and Road Initiative, the country has integrated ecological guidelines into overseas cooperation, promoting green and low carbon development as a key pillar. The Belt and Road International Green Development Coalition, which brings together governments, institutions, and experts from dozens of countries, has become an important platform for policy exchange, technology sharing, and practical project level collaboration.

South-South cooperation has emerged as one of China's most impactful contributions to the global green transition. Developing countries face a dual challenge: they must grow economically while simultaneously reducing carbon intensity and building resilience to climate shocks. For many, access to finance and technology remains the principal bottleneck. China's green financing partnerships, capacity building programs, and technology cooperation mechanisms are beginning to address these gaps in pragmatic and results oriented ways.

Whether through joint research centers, renewable energy demonstration projects, or training programmes for thousands of officials



and engineers, China has supported developing nations in enhancing their ability to implement sustainable solutions. This stands in contrast to the conditionalities often attached to Western assistance or the slow pace of multilateral climate finance disbursement.

China's role is also visible in climate diplomacy at the United Nations and other multilateral forums. The country played a constructive part in the adoption of the Paris Agreement and continues to uphold its commitments while urging developed nations to fulfil theirs. China's recent announcements of new Nationally Determined Contributions reflect a determination to peak carbon emissions before twenty thirty and achieve carbon neutrality before twenty sixty. For a country of China's size, complexity, and development stage, these commitments are not just ambitious, they are transformative.

Critics sometimes question China's ongoing reliance on some fossil fuels to meet energy security needs. Yet this critique often ignores the scale of China's transition and the structural realities it faces as the world's largest developing economy. No country has attempted a shift of this magnitude while supporting a population of one point four billion and maintaining rapid technological and industrial growth. The direction is clear, the policies are consistent, and the pace of renewable expansion far outstrips that of any Western nation.

The global green transition will require cooperation, not confrontation. Climate change does not recognize national borders, nor can it be addressed by fragmenting global supply chains or politicizing energy transitions. China's approach offers a model grounded in mutual benefit, technological pragmatism, and shared progress. At a time when many countries face widening financing gaps and implementation challenges, China's experience in scaling green markets, promoting innovation, and reducing costs can help bridge the divide.

As the world looks ahead to the next decade of climate action, China's role will continue to grow. Its leadership is not about replacing others but about contributing meaningfully to a collective effort. By expanding clean energy globally, strengthening South-South cooperation, and championing a development pathway that links prosperity with sustainability, China is helping to shape a greener, more inclusive future.

The global community should recognize that the success of the green transition will depend not on isolating major actors, but on building broad based partnerships. 




